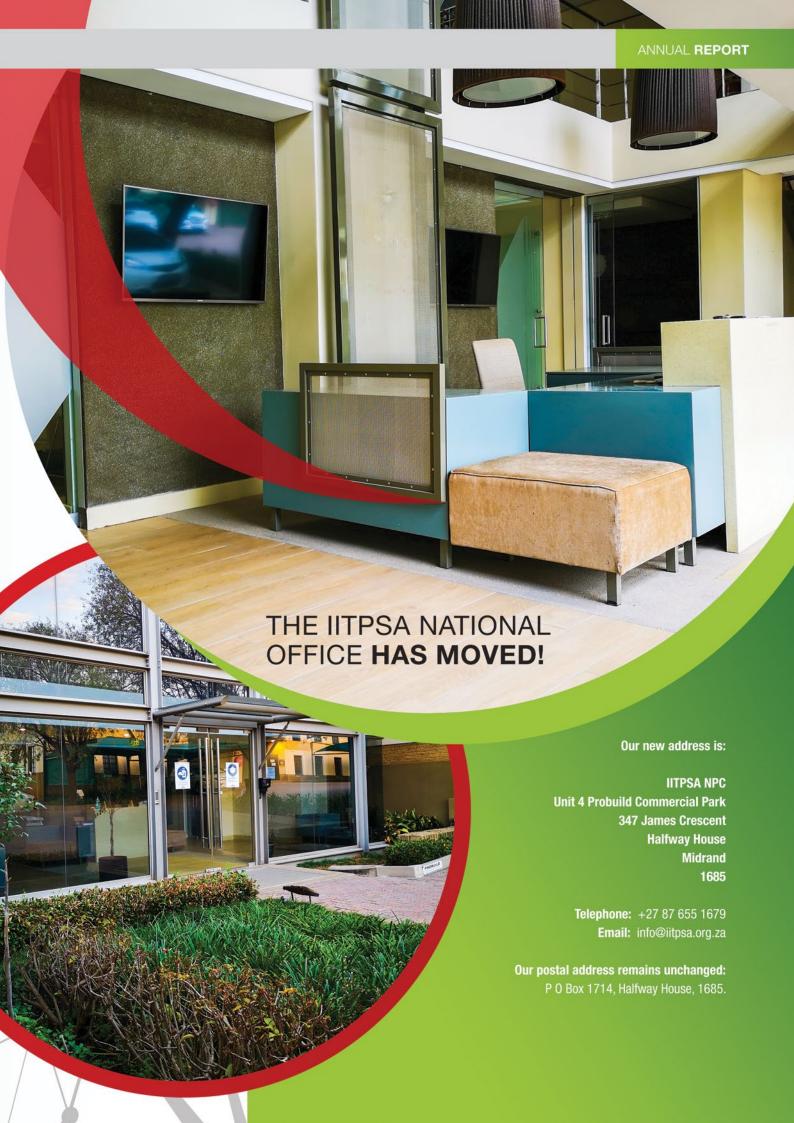

# **ABOUT IITPSA**

# 1.1 BACKGROUND

ITPSA has a long-standing reputation as a professional body in the ICT sector and now has over 10 000 members. Our main objective is to promote the ICT professional by representing our members and positively impacting the ICT industry.

This IITPSA annual report covers the financial year 1st March 2019 to 29th February 2020 and aims to keep our stakeholders informed about the highlights of the past financial year, our structure and governance, the activities of the institute and its financial position.

# 1.2 LEGAL STATUS

The Institute (IITPSA) was originally registered as The Computer Society of South Africa (CSSA) in terms of the Companies Act No. 46 of 1926 as amended and today remains incorporated as a Non-Profit Company (IITPSA NPC) in terms of the Companies Act No. 71 of 2008 as amended.

# 1.3 MANDATE

The Institute is established to represent, promote and elevate the arts, science and general knowledge of Information and Communications Technology (ICT) in South Africa, and, in particular, to advance and represent the interests, development and professionalism of all those employed in the ICT industry. In support of these objectives, the Institute undertakes the following specific activities:

- Gather information and informed opinions pertaining to the ICT industry from members and other authoritative sources, and disseminate such information and facilitate the exchange of views within the Institute to members, the public and other selected audiences by electronic means, journals, publications, lectures, seminars, conferences and any other appropriate channels;
- > Provide an effective voice for industry practitioners to inform, advise and lobby Government and other bodies on ICT policy;
- Set standards and provide well-documented paths to enable practitioners within the industry to develop their skills and further their careers, and to obtain professional recognition;
- Collect, document and assess information about qualifications, certifications, and other sources of learning pertaining to the various fields
  of activity within the ICT industry, and to make this information available both to members and to others;
   Certify qualifications, certifications, courses, training schemes and events as part of the Institute's assessment criteria for the acceptance
  of members and the administration of Continuing Professional Development (CPD);
- Identify, develop and maintain relationships with other South African and international bodies and entities that have a common or synergistic purpose, objectives, interests and/or influence over the activities of our members or others in the ICT Industry;
- Seek membership and/or representation by and for the Institute within the structures of local and international bodies and entities where this is beneficial to the Institute and its members;
- Provide non-judicial arbitration in disputes pertaining to the ICT industry;
- > Engage in community development that enhances the standards and levels of ICT for the greater good of the South African people; and
- Do all such other lawful things as are incidental or conducive to the attainment of the above objectives.

## 1.5 RELATIONSHIPS WITH OTHER ORGANISATIONS

As a SAQA-recognised and IFIP IP3 accredited professional body for ICT practitioners, IITPSA is both involved and active in the wider ICT community in South Africa and understands the value of appropriate professional relationships with other organisations, including those in the public, private and non-profit sectors of the economy where numerous formal and informal relationships exist.

In the 'other professional body' arena, IITPSA has relationships with ISACA South Africa Chapter, ISC2 Gauteng Chapter and SAIEE.

IITPSA is a member of the SA Independent Professional Bodies Forum, the International Federation for Information Processing (IFIP), the IFIP International Professional Practice Partnership (IFIP IP3), the African ICT Alliance (AfICTA) and the Federation of Enterprise Architecture Professional Organisations (FEAPO).

The Institute has Board level representation on the CIO Council of South Africa, AfiCTA and IFIP IP3, and had a seat on the MICT SETA Accounting Authority. An IITPSA nominee served as a Councillor on the B-BBEE ICT Sector Council until 31 January 2020, and IITPSA is also represented on the international Skills Framework for the Information Age (SFIA) Council.

As we all know, the South African economy faced a very challenging time during the period under review. This also impacted on the Institute

in terms of financial performance against the prior year, although there was a very pleasing performance against the original budget.

Overall membership remained almost static, but fully paid up membership declined from the prior year position. However, as you will read in the following pages of this annual report, much has been, is being and will be done to engage members more, provide more benefits and improve the brand identity and the broader community's awareness of the country's most credible professional body for ICT professionals.

The Institute is making every effort to ensure that our current members' confidence in us is justified, and to attract new members into the fold. During the past year, we have stepped up our marketing, events and overall engagement with our members, especially through our social media channels. We have started investing our revenues back into our membership and communities.

During 2019, IITPSA grew our staff complement, welcoming aboard Nashia Rajcoomar – Head of Operations and Kelvin Nhlapo – Head of Business Development. Sithobile Mabena joined us in the Receptionist / Front Office role, and Neshrene Reddy joined in November 2019, taking over as Finance Manager from Sue Gornall, who has emigrated to Australia. We also increased the number of industry events we partnered, securing extensive media exposure for the Institute and for our objectives. Our KZN and Western Cape regional chapters, as well as our Gauteng Special Interest Groups, were particularly active during the past year, and we look forward to their ongoing momentum.

An important milestone for us was the official launch of the Professional CIO (Pr.CIO $^{\text{TM}}$ ) designation, to formally recognise South African ICT professionals meeting the required levels of academic achievement and professional experience. This designation, endorsed by the CIO Council of South Africa, added the ultimate level to the membership progression pathway for ICT Practitioners: Student Member (optional) >> Affiliate Member >> Associate Member (AMIITPSA) >> Member (MIITPSA) >> Professional Member (PMIITPSA) (registered professional designation on the NQF) > Professional CIO (Pr.CIO).

# HIGHLIGHTS FROM 2019/20

## 4.1 STRATEGIC HIGHLIGHTS

In support of our continued efforts to improve ICT professionalism and enhance professional and career development, IITPSA launched its new IITPSA professional designation on 14 August 2019 for Chief Information Officers (CIO), called Professional CIO (Pr.CIO<sup>TM</sup>). This was very well received. Six Professional CIOs were recognised at the launch event, and, since then, a number of applications have been received, processed and the designation awarded.

IITPSA participated in several key ICT industry events in the past year, including the 2019 Gartner Symposium and ITxpo (an IITPSA first) and Leaderex. Our regional chapters and special interest groups (SIGs) hosted 22 well-attended Chapter and SIG events in 2019. We would like to thank the Chairpersons of each chapter and SIG for their efforts to arrange topical and informative sessions for IITPSA members as this is a key underpinning of our strategic objective of improving stakeholder engagement. The events, both industry and internal, also provided excellent Continuing Professional Development (CPD) opportunities for IITPSA members.

IITPSA featured strongly in the online ICT media during the year, thanks in no small part to the efforts of our outsourced PR and Digital Marketing associates, giving a platform for IITPSA's thought leadership.

Another key thought leadership activity, the annual ICT Skills Survey, produced in a partnership between IITPSA and the Joburg Centre for Software Engineering at Wits University, was again very well received and it has become the 'go to' resource for ICT skills information in South Africa.

Based on the concept of continuous improvement, the Board has appointed a three-person governance task team to help drive IITPSA governance improvements. Following on from the work and recommendations of the task team, an external service provider was appointed after the assessment of responses to a Request for Proposal. The service provider has been working with the Task Team, and IITPSA management, to put in place, and / or improve, the Board Charter and various Board Committees' terms of reference.



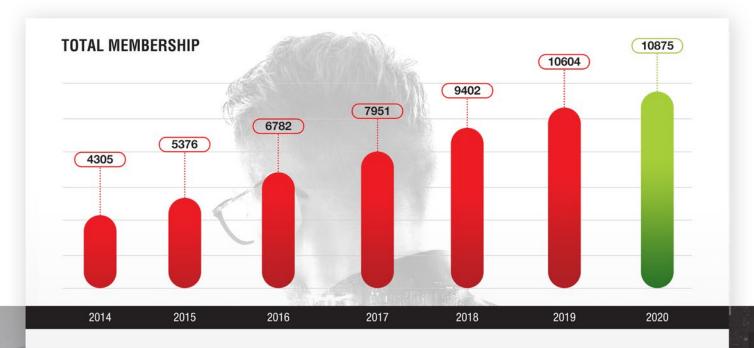
## 4.2 FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

The IITPSA continues to be a financially stable organisation with a very solid balance sheet. As is shown in the audited annual financial statements, an abridged version of which is included in this annual report, the 2019/20 financial year saw the return of a 'modest' surplus of R2 178 134, but this compared very favourably with the budgeted deficit of R433 000. Overall gross revenue came in at R10 824 303, which, whilst down on the prior year's R14 023 561, was a fair performance in a difficult economic climate.

Looking ahead to 2020 - 2021, the advent of the global COVID-19 pandemic and the reduction of local interest rates by 2.5% in the first few months of calendar 2020 is likely to have a significant negative impact on most South African organisations, including IITPSA.

# 4.3 OPERATING HIGHLIGHTS

The overall membership of IITPSA continued to grow as may be seen from the chart below. However, there remains a key opportunity for IITPSA to grow local membership going forward. More attention will also be given to activities which will aim to improve both the membership retention ratio and the ratio of members who are paid up and in good standing with the Institute.



Critical Skills assessments continue to provide a valuable revenue stream for the Institute and provide an access point for skilled foreign ICT practitioners who are coming to work in South Africa to join the Institute. The continued growth in membership led to the staffing structure of the National Office being revisited and, after receiving Board approval, new staff members were appointed in March and April 2020, as noted in the CEO's Message, earlier.

The roll-out of digital badges (Privyseal) to all IITPSA members in good standing continued during 2019. This is an extremely valuable member benefit as it provides an instant way for members to provide verification of their IITPSA membership status and professional standing to employers, potential clients and others. All eligible IITPSA members are encouraged to apply for their digital badge and to display it as evidence of their professional status.

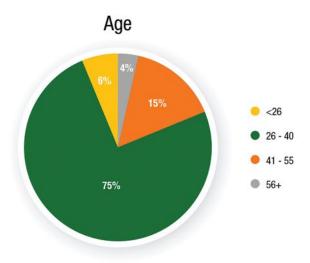
Social Media and Public Relations activity was ramped up significantly during the past year, with the appointment of a professional digital marketing and PR associate organisation to help build IITPSA's brand and digital presence, particularly via the online ICT media as well as IITPSA's own social media channels (Facebook, Twitter, LinkedIn and YouTube).



# 4.4 MEMBERSHIP

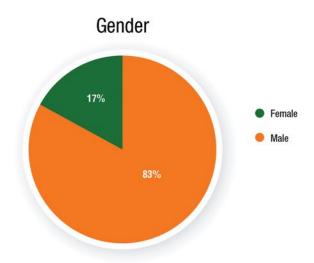
Membership grew marginally in the 2019/20 year, from a starting point of 10 604 members to a year end count of 10 875.

In the graphs below, we have highlighted some of the elements that make up our membership profile.

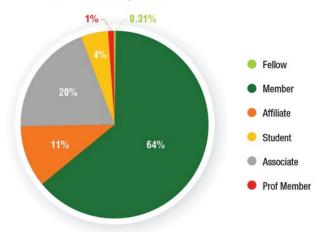


75% of members are in the highly active 26 - 40 age group, in the prime years of their professional development. 6% are starting and in the early years of their careers, and 19% are seen to be senior practitioners.

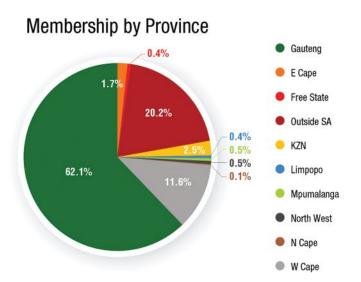
Only 17% of our members are female, which remains unchanged from the previous year. This is also indicative of the fact that the large majority of our immigrant members are male. Our Women in IT Chapter is raising the focus on Women in the ICT profession.



# Membership Grade

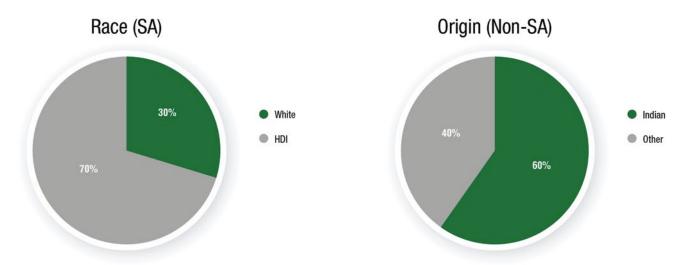


The membership grade analysis is very similar to that of the prior year, with almost two thirds of the membership body falling into the MIITPSA or higher (PMIITPSA (including Pr.CIO) and FIITPSA) grades, and the remaining third working towards qualifying for these designations. We continue to actively promote the value of the PMIITPSA and new Pr.CIO designations, both of which signify the commitment to excellence in the profession.

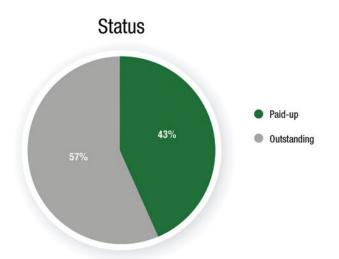


62% of members are resident in Gauteng, and 11% in the Western Cape. Significantly, 20% of the members are resident outside of South Africa, sharply up from the 14.5% of the prior year.

The following two graphs consider the racial profile of our South African members and the geographic origins of our non-South African members. It is very pleasing to note the predominance of Black, Asian and Coloured South Africans (HDI) within our membership body. This proportion has improved from 67% in the prior year, to 70% this year.



Once again, the proportion of non-South African National practitioners is dominated by those coming from the Indian subcontinent, and at 60%, is 1% up on last year.



Finally, we note a decline in the proportion of our members who are in "good standing" (i.e. paying their subscriptions on time), which is indicative of the difficult economic climate that prevailed during the twelve month period under review.



# 4.5 LOOKING AHEAD

Our IITPSA strategic goals remain our prime directives, and IITPSA intends to continue meeting milestones to help progress towards them, including growing ICT professionalism through introducing more professional designations, participating in more key industry events, growing the Computer Olympiad competitions' footprint and introducing member self-service. We will also continue to focus on both the Women and Youth sectors of our membership and our professional community, and supporting our Women in IT Chapter in gaining traction in establishing its identity and key objectives.

As an added benefit to IITPSA members, the business development department is actively engaging with prospective training providers to fulfill continuous professional development (CPD) needs. This will add real value to the IITPSA benefits portfolio and underpins our commitment to our members. The main objective is to provide opportunities for ICT, management and soft skills training to all of our members, including to our small and medium enterprise business owners. To qualify as an approved training provider, training organisations will need to pass a rigorous quality assurance process.



# STRUCTURE & GOVERNANCE

## 5.1 BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Board of Directors of the Institute of Information Technology Professionals South Africa consists of elected members (all of whom are IITPSA members) and may also have co-opted members. Both elected and co-opted members serve as Non-Executive Directors. Board members also serve on one or more Board Committees. The CEO is an ex-officio Board member and Executive Director of the Institute.

The graphic below shows all of the Board members for the full financial year and indicates the Chairpersons of the various Board Committees.

Drs Chris Johl and Kiru Pillay both stood down from the Board at the 31 July 2019 Annual General Meeting and, due to work commitments, were unable to make themselves available for re-election. The other nine Board Members (eight Non-Executive Directors and the CEO) all served for the full period of the financial year.

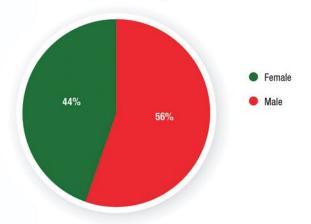

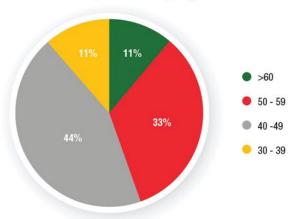


# 5.1.2 BOARD COMPOSITION AS AT 29 FEB 2020

# 5.2 BOARD COMMITTEES

# 5.2.1 AUDIT AND RISK COMMITTEE

#### By Chairperson of the Audit and Risk Committee: Karel Mathee

The IITPSA ("the Institute") audit and risk committee is a board committee. The committee functions within documented terms of reference and complies with relevant legislation, regulation and governance codes. This report of the audit and risk committee is presented to members in compliance with the requirements of the Companies Act and the revised King Code of Governance Principles ("King IV").

#### **ROLE OF THE COMMITTEE**

The audit and risk committee ("the committee") has an independent role with accountability to both the board and to members. The committee's responsibilities include the statutory duties prescribed by the Companies Act, activities recommended by King IV as well as additional responsibilities assigned by the board.

#### The responsibilities of the committee are as follows:

#### **Annual reporting**

- · Review the annual financial statements;
- · Review and approve the appropriateness of accounting policies, disclosure policies and the effectiveness of internal financial controls;
- · Perform an oversight role on the Institute's annual reporting and consider factors and risks that could impact on the integrity of the annual report;
- · Review sustainability disclosure in the annual report and ensure it does not conflict with financial information;
- · Consider external assurance of material sustainability issues; and
- · Recommend the annual report for approval by the board.

#### **Combined assurance**

- . Ensure the combined assurance model addresses all significant risks facing the Institute; and
- · Monitor the relationship between external and internal assurance providers and the Institute.

#### **Finance function**

- · Consider the expertise and experience of the finance manager; and
- · Consider the expertise, experience and resources of the Institute's finance function.



#### Risk management

Make recommendations to the board on levels of risk tolerance and risk appetite;

- · Ensure risk management is integrated into business operations;
- · Ensure risk management assessments are conducted on a continuous basis;
- . Ensure frameworks and methodologies are implemented to increase the possibility of anticipating unpredictable risks;
- · Ensure that management considers and implements appropriate risk responses;
- · Express the committee's opinion in the effectiveness of the system and process of risk management; and
- . Ensure risk management reporting in the annual report is comprehensive and relevant.

#### **External audit**

- · Review the quality and effectiveness of the external audit process; and
- . Ensure a process is in place for the committee to be informed of any reportable irregularities identified by the external auditor.

#### COMPOSITION OF THE COMMITTEE

The committee comprised three independent non-executive directors during the period. These directors include suitably skilled directors having recent and relevant financial and risk management experience. The committee is elected by the board after the annual general meeting.

## INTERNAL CONTROL

Systems of internal control are designed to manage, rather than eliminate, the risk of failure to achieve business objectives and to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance against misstatement or loss.

While the board is responsible for the internal control systems and for reviewing their effectiveness, responsibility for their actual implementation and maintenance rests with executive management. The systems of internal control are based on established organisational structures, together with written policies and procedures, and provide for suitably qualified employees, segregation of duties, clearly defined lines of authority and accountability. They also include cost and budgeting controls, and comprehensive management reporting.

#### **INTERNAL FINANCIAL CONTROLS**

The committee has assessed information and explanations given by management on the results of the 2019/20 audit. Through this process no material matter has come to the attention of the audit and risk committee or the board that has caused the directors to believe that the company's system of internal controls and risk management is not effective and that the internal financial controls do not form a sound basis for the preparation of reliable financial statements.



#### **EXTERNAL AUDIT**

The external auditor has unrestricted access to the Institute's records and management. The auditor furnishes a written report on significant findings arising from the annual audit.

The audit partner in charge of the audit is rotated off the audit after five years. In terms of this policy, the current audit partner is in the second year of tenure. The Institute has received confirmation from the external auditor that the partners and staff responsible for the audit comply with all legal and professional requirements with regard to rotation and independence. The committee is satisfied that the external auditor is independent of the company.

#### **ACTIVITIES OF THE COMMITTEE**

The committee met three times during the financial year and attendance at the meetings is detailed in the table above. Members of the committee and the external auditor may request a non-scheduled meeting if they consider this necessary. The chairperson of the committee will determine if such a meeting should be convened.

Minutes of the meetings of the committee, except those recording private meetings with the external auditors, are circulated to all directors and supplemented by an update from the committee chairperson at each board meeting. Matters requiring action or improvement are identified and appropriate recommendations made to the board.

The chairperson of the committee attends the Annual General Meeting to answer any questions on the committee's activities.

The committee performed the following activities relating to the audit function during the year under review, with certain of these duties being required in terms of the Companies Act:

- · reviewed the Institute's internal financial control and financial risk management systems; and
- reviewed and recommended to the board for approval the annual report and annual financial statements.

#### **EVALUATION OF FINANCE MANAGER AND FINANCE FUNCTION**

The committee is satisfied that the expertise and experience of both the previous and the current finance manager are appropriate to meet the responsibilities of the position. This is based on the qualifications, levels of experience, continuing professional education and the board's assessment of the financial knowledge of the finance manager.

The Institute of Information Technology Professionals South Africa (IITPSA) recognises its importance in the communities and environment where it operates and pursues its business goals. The organisation's Code of Conduct is used as the foundation for ethical decision making.

The Board sets out the Corporate Governance Framework for the organisation, and, within this context has constituted the Social and Ethics Committee (SEC) as a committee of the Board to ensure that all decisions and activities are based on an ethical and sustainable foundation. This includes Board decisions as well as operational activities.

In future, the SEC will also oversee decisions about membership. It also plans to offer a "sounding board" to members if they want to discuss ethical issues in their workplaces.

The new Social and Ethics Committee met once during the year under review, with all committee members present. Going forward, the Committee will meet quarterly.



# 5.2.6 MEMBERS COUNCIL AND CHAPTER COMMITTEES

Chapter Committees represent the members at a local (provincial) level and are elected by the members in that area at Chapter Annual General Meetings, which usually take place between January and April each year. Their mandate is to engage more directly with the local IITPSA members, by delivering events of topical interest.

In the past, Chapter Committee Chairpersons were ex officio members of the Executive Council of the Institute, which, at the start of the life of the Institute, was its governing body. # **ACTIVITIES**

# 6.1 IITPSA SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMME

IITPSA has been involved with the Programming Olympiad for several years. To date, very few girls make it to the finals, and no girl has ever been on the team that goes to the International Olympiad in Informatics (IOI).

Relatively few girls' schools offer IT as a subject. Most of those that do only teach Delphi, as dictated by the Department of Basic Education (DBE). The Olympiad requires a programming language such as Java. To increase the number of girls who enter the ICT industry, which in turn will help address the skills shortage, IITPSA runs a scholarship programme:

- Girls who win medals in the Talent Search competition are invited to apply for the scholarship. This competition tests logical thinking and reasoning.
- > IITPSA sponsors selected girls to study Java Programming through the SSir Online School, which aligns to the IEB examination. The scholarship covers tuition and books in Grade 10, 11 & 12.
- > This is an additional subject and requires commitment from the learners to spend the extra time on the course. They must also get accustomed to learning online. Learners are rewarded with R1000 on successful completion of a year, to provide some motivation.
- > We have provided informal mentoring to the girls, but plan to make this more formal in future.
- > In the longer term, IITPSA hopes that the girls who complete matric will be suitable candidates for the IITPSA bursary for tertiary study.

Of three learners who were enrolled in 2017, only one completed through to Matric. She decided not to study a degree but is enrolled for an IT diploma course this year through a reputable training organisation. IITPSA has provided some funding for this. Three learners who started their course in 2018 are now in matric.

All 2017 and 2018 Grade 10's were based in the Western Cape. Since 2019, we have made the scholarship available country wide. Only three of those who were awarded scholarships for 2019 progressed to Grade 11.

We now support three girls in Grade 12, and, in addition, are funding a young man with disabilities who achieved excellent marks in previous grades.

IITPSA has not awarded any scholarships to Grade 10's in 2020.

Learners are encouraged to enter the Programming Olympiad, and we are hopeful that as these girls have received excellent tuition, with a great deal of programming practice, they will become finalists.





# 6.2.1 TALENT SEARCH

The South African Computer Olympiad is a project of the Institute of Information Technology Professionals of South Africa (IITPSA). The Olympiads exist to encourage school learners to study and prepare for careers using IT. They achieve this by providing three national contests from basic levels and up to the level of international participation. Olympiads encourage talented learners to strive beyond the curriculum, and as an effect to raise the level of their classmates. The Computer Olympiad ran three free school-based contests in 2019. All three were run online, but were also available as pen-and-paper versions for schools lacking connectivity.

Certificates for the top 50% of learners were printed and posted to schools: Gold to the top 7%, silver to the next 14%, and bronze to the next 29%. Participation was supervised by a teacher. The principal and the teacher signed the certificates.

The Talent Search ran for a week in March 2019. It was provided to schools at five age levels for learners from grades 4 to 12. Participants attempted 15 questions in 45 minutes – only 12 questions for the youngest group. In total 21,514 learners took part from 258 schools nationwide. A third of all participants were from grades 8 and 9 because many high schools use it to guide grade 10 subject choice for science and computer subjects.

The questions are set annually by computer science specialists from 50 countries to test and develop scientific thinking. In South Africa Talent Search questions were given in English and Afrikaans, and participants answered online or with pen-and-paper.

In the first term of 2019 a Computer Olympiad Board member (Pieter Waker) ran 19 'Problem Solving using Talent Search' workshops attended by 326 teachers in the Northern Cape, Western Cape, and Eastern Cape. These workshops were funded by South African Agency Science and Technology Advancement.

## 6.2.2 THE APPLICATIONS OLYMPIAD

The Applications Olympiad is funded by IITPSA. The contest ran for a week in the second term. This contest has run since 2010 for CAT learners and others who know Word, Excel, and Access. Large data sets were provided to participants for them to use in order to answer 20 questions in one hour. In the first round a total of 5,530 learners took part from 243 schools, and 539 from 151 schools in the second round. Twelve learners from five provinces competed in the final round at Bergyliet High School during the winter school holiday. One gold, two silver, and three bronze medals were awarded to the top performers.

In the Applications Olympiad, twelve grade 11 and 12 learners from across South Africa emerged as the country's best CAT learners from the field of contestants taking part in the 10th annual Applications Olympiad. The event included two school-based rounds, followed by the finals in Cape Town. Tapiwa Chikwanda of Michaelhouse (KwaZulu-Natal) received the gold medal and the IITPSA trophy.



During the first four months of 2019, with SAASTA funding, one of our Board members (Mike Chiles) ran 20 workshops for 363 teachers in five provinces in KwaZulu-Natal, Limpopo, Western Cape, Gauteng and Free State (including 83 preservice teachers in Welkom).

The questions were designed to test whether learners could use what they have learned to solve problems requiring creativity. Problems were set by a Scientific Committee composed of experienced specialists. Each year a new theme is selected – the 2019 rounds 1 and 2 used data from a cycling tour.

# 6.2.3 THE PROGRAMMING OLYMPIAD

The Programming Olympiad ran for a week in the third term. This contest has run since 1985 for learners and others who can write a program to solve a problem. Any programming language could be used for the first round where learners solved three problems in one hour. In the first round a total of 2,543 learners took part from 182 schools. The 308 learners from 127 schools in the second round had to use the saco-evaluator.org.za. In the past this online evaluator had only been used in the final round. While some schools found this unfamiliar system to be a challenge, it allowed all 19 learners in the final round to achieve a positive score. Three provinces competed in the final round at the University of Cape Town over two days, 28 and 29 September. They had to solve three problems within five hours each day. One gold, two silver, and three bronze medals were awarded to the top performers. Four of these will compete in the International Olympiad in Informatics in Singapore from 19 to 26 July, 2020.

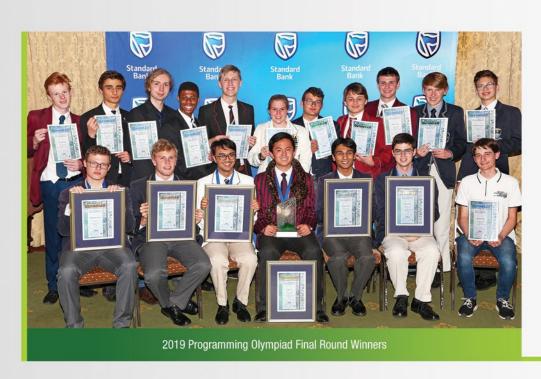
Andi Qu, a grade 11 learner at St John's College in Johannesburg, won the Standard Bank Trophy at the 2019 national Programming Olympiad, but eight of the year's top 10 learners were from the Western Cape. The 36th South African Programming Olympiad saw high school learners from across the country contesting two rounds to reach the finals, where candidates had to use Python, Java, C++ and Pascal (for Delphi users) to solve a number of problems over two days.

Problems were set by a Scientific Committee composed of past winners and experienced specialists.

# 2019 JCSE-IITPSA ICT SKILLS SURVEY

The JCSE (Joburg Centre for Software Engineering) is a University of Witwatersrand partnership with government and industry, founded in 2005. The 2019 version was the JCSE's tenth edition of its survey of skills trends in the South African information & communications technology (ICT) sector and its second in full partnership with the IITPSA. The Tenth Edition was completed and published in September 2019.

The report examines the ICT environment, both locally and internationally, identifying emerging trends that influence the supply and demand of ICT skills. The survey reviews the available research from the Sector Education & Training Authorities (SETAs) and other sources to provide context for the data collected from respondents to the online questionnaire.

Some of the issues highlighted in the report are perennial, such as the delayed rollout of broadband access and the poor state of education in South Africa, with particular reference to the low number of learners achieving competence in STEM subjects. Others focus on emerging topics, such as the impact of the Fourth Industrial Revolution (4IR) on policy and on the shifts in skills required.

The JCSE-IITPSA ICT Skills Survey is highly regarded by many stakeholders and is often quoted in articles and other publications. Its authors are regularly called on to provide comment and input to skills-related topics.

# 6.4 LEADEREX

IITPSA co-hosted the well-attended Digital Skills Summit at Leaderex 2019 in Sandton on 3 September 2019, where IITPSA's Adrian Schofield, who collaborates with the Johannesburg Centre for Software Engineering (JCSE) on its annual ICT Skills Survey, delivered a talk on the state of digital skills in South Africa. He noted that South Africa's education system and enterprise environment were simply not geared to deliver high end ICT skills in the numbers South Africa needs. Also speaking at the event, IITPSA's Ulandi Exner discussed the cybersecurity skills required to create secure systems.







## 6.5 CIO DESIGNATION LAUNCH

The Institute of Information Technology Professionals South Africa (IITPSA) has introduced the Professional Chief Information Officer (Pr.CIO<sup>TM</sup>) designation for top level South African ICT professionals. This designation is given to those meeting the required levels of academic achievement and professional experience. This designation is endorsed by the CIO Council of South Africa.

At the 14 August 2019 event the CEO, Tony Parry, described the designation in this way, "This designation is awarded at the highest level in the profession, and officially recognises the achievements of the individuals concerned".

The first six ClOs to be awarded the new designation received their accreditation at the launch. They were Renier van der Merwe of Premier Foods, Martin Coetsee of DRA Global, Tshifhiwa Ramuthaga of Barloworld Logistics (Visionary ClO 2014), Yolisa Skwintshi of Absa Insurance, Louise van der Bank of AfriSam (Visionary ClO finalist) and Amanda Maritz of Essilor.



## 6.6 ITWEB SECURITY SUMMIT

ITWeb's Security Summit (28 May 2019) was a comprehensive update on the latest cyber and information security threats and solutions. This Expo enabled delegates to hear the latest best practices for cloud security, Al, IoT, blockchain, DevSecOps and more. Sessions offered the opportunity to learn how to evolve IT security, risk and governance strategy to support business in the digital age. It is the premier information update and networking platform for CISOs and security, risk and privacy professionals in South Africa. IITPSA was a value partner for the summit, gaining valuable exposure.

## 6.7 ICT INFRASTRUCTURE 2019

The ICT Infrastructure event (28-29 August 2019) explored considerations and solutions across the entire ICT value chain with the goal of information sharing for the benefit of South Africa's ICT infrastructure, and thus its citizens and businesses. The theme and sub-themes of ICT Infrastructure 2019 were focused on a range of vital elements relating to the planning, installation, operation, and backup of information and communication technologies. Data Centres in Africa, with South Africa being the focus, were discussed. IITPSA had a booth at this expo and added many new contacts to its network.





# 6.8 EASTERN CAPE DOE ANNUAL TEACHERS CELEBRATION SEMINAR

IITPSA was invited to provide a guest presenter at a memorial lecture in the Eastern Cape Province, where Teachers celebrated the World Teachers' Day in Cradock, South Africa.

The 5th of October is internationally recognized as World Teachers' Day but the Department of Education in the Eastern Cape dedicates the day to the late struggle icon Mr Matthew Goniwe, a Mathematics and Science teacher of the time. IITPSA was requested to present on IT, linking it with the 4<sup>th</sup> Industrial Revolution. The proposed theme was: "The world has moved, have our teachers moved?" Kelvin Nlhapo, the Head of IITPSA Business Development, was the speaker at this event.



# 6.9 GARTNER SYMPOSIUM / ITXPO

The Gartner Symposium 2019 took place in Cape Town from 16th to 18th September.

Thousands of CIOs and IT executives came together in Cape Town during September to discuss key topics, including data and analytics, artificial intelligence (Al), machine learning, culture, customer experience, cybersecurity, and more.

The Gartner Symposium / ITXpo is known as the world's most important gathering of ClOs and IT executives, where they explore the technology, insights and latest trends shaping the future of IT and business. At Gartner, technology and information insights meet business strategy and networking. IITPSA had a booth for the first time in its history at Gartner in 2019, and connected with ICT decision makers of major organizations in South Africa. These relationships are being used for networking and advantage to boost the growth of IITPSA.

IITPSA held a lucky draw to give one IITPSA member in good standing a free ticket to the symposium, valued at R25 000.

The event was to empower 13 young women in the department with knowledge on how to succeed in their studies and essentially become effective professionals in IT, which is generally seen as a field for men.

As such, TUT asked the IITPSA to send one of the leading women in our organisation to be a keynote speaker at the event. They requested the speaker to share her experiences in the IT profession, such as challenges she encountered as a female student and in the workplace with the topic "succeeding in the IT profession AS A WOMAN".

IITPSA speaker of the day was Azwi Sigama, She is a member of the Gauteng Chapter Committee and a Senior System Architect at Eskom.

He has been promoting IT careers and specifically programming, through the use of the TANKS app, to school children with limited access to computers throughout South Africa.

In addition, Professor Greyling has played a very substantial role in organising millions of Rands in bursaries, enabling students in need to study Computing Sciences at Nelson Mandela University, mostly via BankSETA.

- > Katherine James, a second year MSc student in the Department of Computer Science at Rhodes University, was chosen as the EC IITPSA 2019 IT Student of the Year
- > Belinda Samuels, Senior Operations Manager of MEA Managed Services at Dimension Data, was awarded the EC IITPSA 2019 Woman in IT Award.
- > Sonny Fisher, the founder of FORUS Global Digital Exchange, was chosen as the EC IITPSA 2019 IT Contributor of the Year.



The Chapter organises a number of events each year, but the talks that we present are often poorly supported. We thus set up a short (6 to 10 minutes to complete), confidential survey to determine what events the Eastern Cape and Border IITPSA members would prefer and what new events the Committee should investigate, in order to improve member support.

The call for participation and two reminders directed at the 176 members finally resulted in 35 survey completions (about a 20% response rate), which was disappointing. Data analytics were run against the survey data revealing useful and actionable information in the responses.

The Women in IT event took place on 14 August 2019 at Savages Restaurant. The speaker was Prof Margie Cullen of the NMU Business School. She spoke on "happiness" and her talk was very inspiring. Sixty ladies attended the event. Prof Lynn Futcher and Dr Sue Petratos organised the event.

An Industry 4.0 and the Industrial Internet of Things talk took place on 29 August 2019 in the Senate Hall, North Campus, NMU. The speaker was Dr Lester Cowley. Twenty people attended the talk and about half of them stayed and asked questions of the speaker for 30 minutes after the talk. Two masters students then discussed their research projects with the speaker for an additional 20 minutes. Prof Jean Greyling and Dr Sue Petratos organised the event.

Prof Van Grembergen, an internationally renowned Information Systems academic and emeritus professor in the Economics and Management Faculty of the University of Antwerp and the Antwerp Management School, presented a talk on "What's New with COBIT 2019: a Critical Review" on 22 October 2019 in the Senate Hall, North Campus, NMU. Prof Rossouw van Solms, Prof Lynn Futcher and Dr Sue Petratos organised the event. This was a Joint IITPSA and ISACA local chapter talk.

The Committee End of Year Function took place on 5 December 2019 at the De Kelder Restaurant, Summerstrand, Port Elizabeth.

Mr Angus de Beer resigned as a Committee member on 13 December 2019, due to a well-deserved promotion carrying a heavier workload.
